Q2. This attractive cocktail shaker in alabaster green from the inter-war years has been **etched** and **gilded**. Who made it?





Q3 Which word has been edited from this glass celebrating a major sporting event?

Q4. This Amalric Walter "fish" in the Dudley Council Collection was made in the early 20th century using what technique?



Q5. This pair of 19th century wine glasses decorated with exotic birds demonstrates two techniques. One describes the way the cranberry overlays the clear glass base, the other how the birds were 'revealed'.



Q6. This model of a bird from the early 21st century was made by Nobile Glassware. What is the technique normally termed?



Q7. This late 20th century goblet has a star cut foot and bowl. What type of cutting is applied to the bowl?



Q8. This fine 19th century jug has a cut foot, engraved sides to bowl and a particular type of decoration applied to the upper section of bowl. This is a characteristic of Stourbridge and is known as what?



Q9. This candlestick has the name "Paul Millar" etched on the underside of the foot. What is the name of the company that made the glass?



Q10 Which cartoonist is renowned for his pony cartoons as seen on this tumbler?



Q11. This is a Victorian air trap vase. What word is normally used to describe the smooth finish?



Q12. A wonderful late 19th century finger bowl possible engraved by Joseph Keller was then finished with another technique, known as?



Q13 This bowl was produced by Webb's of Stourbridge in the 1930's for the Rembrandt Guild based in Birmingham. What techniques were used to produce it?



Q14. This 19th century, "spa" souvenir glass which has been stained or flashed, engraved and cut (the surround of the cartouche for the engraved scene). Which area of Europe does it come from?



Q15 This is one of the 12 panels called "The 12 Labours of Hercules" created by Walsh Glass. How were they produced?



Q16. Cocktail glass from the inter-war years, probably Czechoslovakian, it has been hand **enamelled** before being embellished

with which type of detailing?



Q17 This superb 19th century goblet has an etched decoration on the bowl and a cut Greek key pattern on foot. What particular type of etching?



Q18. This elephant by Manchester company Burtles Tate was made using which process, common in the NE and NW during the latter nineteenth century?



Q19. This large plate by Manchester company Molineaux Webb features the Greek key motif surrounded by a pale area. How is the pale area normally described?



Q20. This glass gets its iridescent sheen from the application of metallic salts while the glass is still hot from the pressing. A final firing of the glass brings out the iridescent properties of the salts. What is the generic name used to describe this type of glassware?
